

CROSS WORDS (KS2 - 5)

This workshop explores the power of language, unpicking the history attached to discriminatory terms, developing young people's understanding of the harm that can be caused by using offensive terms and helping young people to understand acceptable terms for talking about issues of equality and identity.

A safe space is created and a 'language amnesty' is in place for the duration of the workshop, allowing open discussion to ensure understanding. The language amnesty is closed before the end of the session to reiterate the importance of not using the inappropriate or harmful terms that have been discussed.

The workshop can be tailored in partnership with the school to address specific issues at an appropriate level.

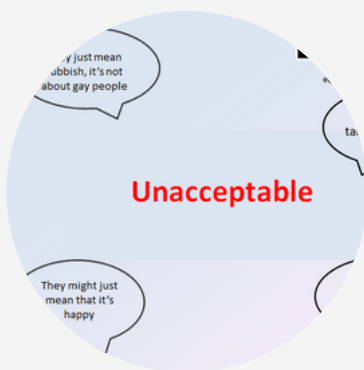
SAMPLE ACTIVITIES



KS2: Talking About Us

Using celebrities such as Sir Mo Farah, young people explore the acceptable terminology that can be used to describe race, ethnicity and nationality.

Outcome: Young people are more confident to discuss issues of race and identity, and have the appropriate terminology in their vocabulary.



KS3-4: Acceptable/Unacceptable

A 'Language Amnesty' is opened, allowing free and open discussion of terminology. Discriminatory terms are discussed, addressing common misconceptions, and explaining the power of language to cause harm.

Outcome: Young people have an understanding of why terms are deemed unacceptable, and the harm that can be caused, empowering them to reject the use of these terms themselves and amongst their friends and family.
